- 4. How do you remember new vocabulary words?
- 5. When you look up an unknown word, what dictionary information is most interesting to you?

What tool has been most useful to you in improving your Japanese reading ability?

- 1. Describe your favorite feature about that tool.
- 2. Describe the thing about that tool that most bothers you.
- 3. What do you do when there's no tool to help you in a situation where you're trying to read Japanese?

How do you read (work-related/non-work-related) Japanese content?

- 1. Describe a time when you struggled to read (work-related/non-work-related) Japanese content.
- 2. What format do you most often read (work-related/non-work-related) Japanese content in? (e.g. web, PDF, Microsoft Word, Excel, etc...)
- 3. What device do you most often read (work-related/non-work-related) Japanese content on? (e.g. desktop, laptop, mobile phone, etc...)
